## Our Program Outcomes for 2014:

<u>Crisis Nurseries</u>: 24/7 free care for children at-risk of abuse or neglect. **1,660 children** visited the Crisis Nurseries, **11,936 total visits** were provided, **1,277 overnight stays** provided, **10,208 meals** were served, and over **62,594 hours of care**.

<u>Counseling</u>: Professional therapy for children, families, and individuals. **717 clients** received **5,783 total hours** of therapy, **316** total individuals attended therapeutic and educational classes for a combined total of **877 hours**.

<u>Family Mentoring Program</u>: Free in-home parenting support. 614 total children and parents served through the Family Mentors and Peer Parenting programs with a combined 2,508 hours of comprehensive in-home support.

Adoption Respite: In-home respite care for families who have adopted at least one child from a public adoption agency in Utah. 116 total children served, 284 in-home visits provided and over 2,100 hours of care.

<u>KidStart Daycare</u>: Professional bi-lingual, curriculum-based daycare services for low-income working families. **76** 

**children served, 61 parents** enabled to better access the workforce, and **2,990 hours** of enriched care offered.

LifeStart Village: Housing and self-sufficiency program for homeless single mothers and their children. 244 individuals served across all three phases of program within 2014, with 50 mothers and their 87 children in Phase I cohousing in the year. Over 685 hours of case management were provided, an average of 80% of women in Phase I made significant improvements in their personal self-sufficiency across 9 critical measurements within the year, 46% INCREASED their income within the year, 44% gained NEW employment within the year, and 9 women enrolled in or graduated higher formal education in the last year.


<u>Safety Net</u>: Outreach, therapeutic and basic needs support, education and advocacy for needy persons associated with the practice of Polygamy as well as those transitioning out of polygamous cultures. **1,779 total persons** served, **82 unduplicated clinical clients**, and **24 families served** with counseling needs.

<u>Volunteers</u>: 821 community volunteers gave 11,459 hours of volunteer service to enhance Family Support Center programs, and donated over \$24,900 in professional service value. Thank you, Volunteers!


